LEGISLATION UPDATE

A rather important question will be answered this September when the US Department of Commerce decides whether or not ICANN (Internet Corporation for Assigned Names and Numbers), a private sector company that coordinates the names and numbers that identify websites around the world, will keep its government contract and continue its very important work.

Foreign powers have been pressing the U.S. to turn this contract over to the United Nations' International Telecommunications Union, a 145-year old agency of nearly 200 nations and territories. Last month a U.S. proposal would have given the international community veto power over any Top Level Domain name (an example of this would be .com or .gov at the end of a website address). The Obama Administration continues to pressure ICANN to allow foreign governments to have control over its policy decisions, based on the logic that if ICANN is too principled about free expression they will ultimately have to turn their authority over to the UN.

One fear given in complaints by foreign leaders is that the US based company could unfairly control the Internet to portray other countries in an unfavorable light. ICANN could, hypothetically, use a country's domain code to direct people to the websites of their choice. The fact that this has never happened and is just one in a long line of possible "what if's" does not seem to bother those demanding that ICANN step aside as they attempt to seize this power for themselves.

On the other hand would an international body governing domain names and making consensus decisions on what should or should not be expressed be a step in the right direction? Or would this international "democratic" process be used to control the speech of dissenters across the political spectrum?

The US Department of Commerce faces a very important decision this fall. They can renew their contract with a private sector company or they can expand the power of the international community as another government agency, this time a foreign power, expands its control over our day-to-day lives.

Obamacare

**One Year Later and Still As Unpopular As Ever
March 23, 2011**

California Republican Party Chairman Tom Del Beccaro — "Instead of an anniversary party, the 63 Democrats who lost their seats in November should be organizing a wake. Polls are now showing that most Americans want Obamacare repealed, 28 states are challenging the law in court, two federal courts have said it's unconstitutional, and 1000+ waivers prove that this law has not achieved the lower costs it promised, let alone brought the country together. If this keeps up, Obamacare's first anniversary might just be its last." **After a year of broken promises and two years of debate, polling clearly shows that the more Americans have learned about ObamaCare, the less they like it:**

TODAY'S CNN POLL: 59% STILL OPPOSE HEALTHCARE LAW: "One year after President Barack Obama signed the health care reform bill into law, a new national poll indicates that attitudes toward the plan have not budged. According to a CNN/Opinion Research Corporation survey released Wednesday, on the one year anniversary of the signing of the law, 37% of Americans support the measure, with 59% opposed. That's basically unchanged from last March, when 39% supported the law and 59% opposed the measure." ("Time doesn't change views on health care law," [CNN Political Ticker](#), 3/23/11)

RASMUSSEN SHOWS 53 PERCENT WANT LAW REPEALED: "The latest Rasmussen Reports national telephone survey finds that 53% of Likely Voters at least somewhat favor repeal of the new health care law,

including 43% who Strongly Favor it. Forty-two percent (42%) oppose repeal, with 27% who are Strongly Opposed." ("Health Care Law," [Rasmussen Reports](#), 3/21/2011)

GALLUP: PLURALITY EXPECTS LAW TO WORSEN HEALTHCARE: "Opinions on the impact of the health-care law on medical care in the U.S. are divided in similar fashion to Americans' overall reactions to the bill: 39% say it will improve medical care in the United States, while **44% say it will make it worse**. Small percentages say the law won't change anything or offer no opinion. These responses are roughly similar to attitudes seen in July 2009, as the outlines of the law were just coming into place." EVEN THE OBAMACARE-FRIENDLY KAISER FAMILY FOUNDATION SHOWS A PLURALITY OPPOSE THE LAW: "The Affordable Care Act's first anniversary comes as a new Kaiser Family Foundation poll tells us that public opinion on the law remains pretty much where it was a year ago, with 42 percent viewing it favorably, versus 46 percent who view it unfavorably. Dems have not succeeded in selling the law to the public." (Greg Sargent, "A Year Later, Dems Remain Unapologetic on Health Care," [The Washington Post](#), 3/18/2011)

Why the Taxpayers' Caucus

At some point we have to say, “stop the madness, stop the presses, just plain stop.” As many predicted, California has spent itself into oblivion. As a result, the Capitol is now besieged by onslaughts of the spend more-tax more crowd. The halls of the Capitol are swarming with specialist interest groups, lobbyists and citizens, all who are equally passionate about securing their share of a shrinking budget pie. But, there are few who come to the State Capitol to stand in the gap for those who cannot be at the Capitol from daylight until dusk - the taxpayers, the ones who pay the bills. Who comes calling to represent their interests?

The Legislature keeps telling the taxpayers that we just need a little bit more of their money - money the citizens need to pay their mortgages, buy food, pay for utilities, and save for retirement. Two years ago, the Legislature approved what was termed a temporary tax increase to fill the state’s gaping budget hole and, in May of 2009, the voters were asked whether they were willing to extend these “temporary” taxes an additional two years. The voters rejected Proposition 1A 65% to 35% - a two-to-one margin.

Now with those taxes expiring, the spend-it-all-and-tax-them-more crowd is clamoring for more. This time “temporary” means five years. The new mantra we will hear is, “This is not really a tax increase; it’s an extension of taxes we’re already paying” or, “the public is used to them.” (Ask them if they are used to it.) I can virtually guarantee that the cry for more will be even louder after another five years. These taxes have real-life impact and cost the average family of four about \$1,500 more a year.

Republicans have met with Governor Brown and Democrat legislators to seek real reforms. We’ve suggested real spending caps, pension reform, eliminating costly and burdensome regulations. We’ve put our ideas on the table, only to be ignored or have them blocked. Who is the real party of “No”?

Instead, Governor Brown is asking us to believe that this time things will be different - burdensome taxes will help our state’s economy and balance the budget - despite the fact that tax increases two years ago have led to nothing but a drop in state tax receipts. In fact, the Governor’s own budget projections predict more deficits and increased spending down the road. Simultaneously, ongoing calls for aggressive regulatory reform continue to fall on deaf ears, though we know that vigorous economic opportunity is the lifeblood of California’s long-term prosperity. Right now, California has the second highest unemployment rate, ranks third from the bottom in employment growth and Chief Executive Magazine continues to rate us as the most anti-business state in the nation.

There is no doubt that the state will continue to struggle until we can demonstrate that California means business. New jobs mean less unemployment, increased consumer spending, and new revenue to support state services. What’s not to like?

Speaking of reform, California’s under-funded retiree expenses cost California’s taxpayers close to \$6 billion this fiscal year, consuming close to 7% of the General Fund. However, this severely underfunded liability isn’t even on the table and there is no reason to believe that the tax-raisers will stop asking for more. Legislation has already been proposed to impose new taxes on sodas, tobacco and probably other tax increases yet to be discovered, not to mention a litany of costly new regulations. These are not budget items, but they point to an insatiable appetite for more of taxpayers’ hard-earned money.

Anyone that can do arithmetic can see we have a need for reform; it’s a matter of when will there be enough like-minded legislators and enough public opinion to turn that corner. I joined the Taxpayers’ Caucus as a public statement of conviction, recognizing that, in the Capitol, the voices of those who pay the bills need to be heard above the clamor of those who will spend every dime - and then some.

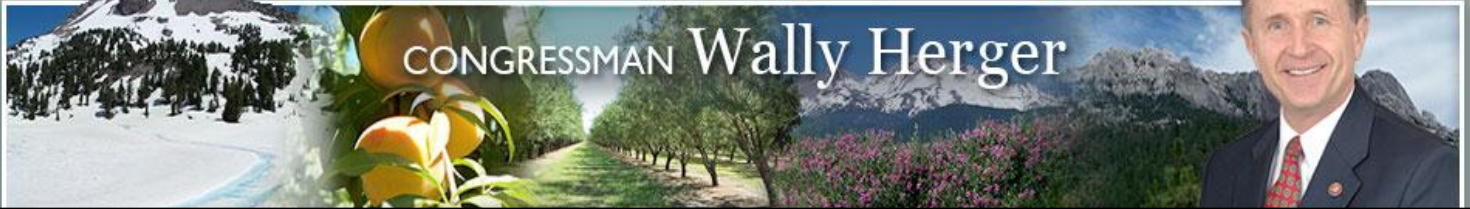

REPORT FROM WASHINGTON

Washington, D.C. – Congressman Wally Herger, Chairman of the Ways & Means Subcommittee on Health, today led the Subcommittee in its first hearing of the year, focusing on the Medicare Payment Advisory Commission’s (MedPAC) Annual March Report to Congress. Herger delivered the following remarks before the committee:

“I want to welcome everyone to the first hearing in the Subcommittee on Health for the 112th Congress. Today, we will be hearing from the Medicare Payment Advisory Commission (MedPAC) on the recommendations in their March 2011 report on Medicare payment policies.

“During this Congress, we must come together to address a fiscal crisis of monumental proportions. Every program, no matter how important, must be scrutinized to ensure that scarce taxpayer dollars are being used appropriately and efficiently. Therefore, I find it fitting that in our inaugural meeting we would hear from MedPAC. The insight and guidance we receive from MedPAC will be very important as we seek ways to reform the Medicare program and improve the accuracy of provider payments while also ensuring that Medicare beneficiaries have access to high-quality care.

“Congress relies on MedPAC’s Medicare provider payment recommendations because they are based on sound policy and strong data analysis. Traditionally, Medicare spending has outpaced growth in the economy at large and is a major driver of our long-term debt. The Congressional Budget Office projects that Medicare spending will nearly double as a share of the U.S. economy over the next twenty-five

years. By 2050, the “Big Three” federal entitlement programs – Medicare, Medicaid, and Social Security – are projected to exceed total tax revenue, with Medicare being the largest of the three. We cannot bring about a fiscally sustainable future if these trends continue. MedPAC’s analysis is invaluable in helping us better understand when growth in Medicare spending is appropriate, and when Medicare payments need to be adjusted.

“Last year, Congress passed a massive health care overhaul law that permanently reduces Medicare payments to a number of providers. Less than 3 percent of the more than one half trillion dollars in cuts from Medicare came from actual delivery reforms. We must do better than that, which is why we also rely on MedPAC’s June report to Congress to guide us toward proposals that offer real reform instead of just turning payment dials up or down. This will help ensure that Medicare savings yield better outcomes for Medicare’s beneficiaries. I think I speak for all of us up here, Republicans and Democrats alike, that we are still looking for the silver bullet that will permanently reform the physician payment system in a fiscally responsible manner and look forward to working with MedPAC to find such a solution.

“I want to offer a warm welcome to our invited witness, MedPAC Chairman Glen Hackbarth. Thank you for joining us today, and I look forward to hearing your testimony. I would also like to extend a special word of thanks to MedPAC’s Executive Director Mark Miller and the entire MedPAC staff for their hard work on this report.”

HOW TO FLY THE UNITED STATES FLAG

Ten Guidelines: Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW)

- The flag should be hoisted briskly and lowered ceremoniously.
- The flag is never allowed to touch the ground or the floor.
- When hung over a sidewalk on a rope extending from a building to a pole, the union stars are always away from the building.
- When vertically hung over the center of the street, the flag always has the union stars to the north in an east/west street, and to the east in a north/south street.
- The flag of the United States of America should be at the center and at the highest point of the group when a number of flags of states or localities or pennants of societies are grouped and displayed from staffs.
- The flag should never be festooned, drawn back, nor up, in folds but always allowed to fall free.
- The flag should be displayed at half-staff until noon on Memorial Day then raised to the top of the staff.
- Never fly the flag upside down except as a signal of distress in instances of extreme danger to life or property.
- The flag is never flown in inclement weather except when using a all-weather flag.
- The flag can be flown every day from sunrise to sunset and at night if illuminated properly.

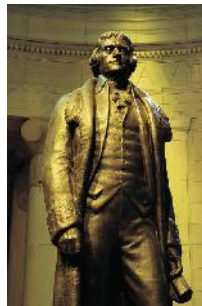

Thomas Jefferson, author of the Declaration of Independence and third president of the United States, was born on April 13, 1743 in Coochland (now Albermarle) County, Virginia. 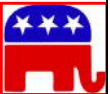
