### CHAPLAIN'S CORNER

In March, 1865, Congress authorized the inscription "In God We Trust" for all United States coins. Then, in 1956, Congress made it our official national motto. Through the years, as we have faced natural calamities, wars, internal strife and great political de-

bates, Americans have never ceased and continue now to pray and ask God to bless America. Based on Psalm 91:2, today, we still proclaim: I will say of the Lord, "He is my refuge and my fortress, my God in whom I trust." So be it this summer, Lord. Amen.

There are three very important issues that we, as Republican women, need to be aware of at the moment. The basis for the proposed legislation that underlie all three of these issues involve a difference in the way our system of governance is viewed and the outcome in these battles will determine the future of our nation.

The issue of requiring Voter ID is very important, and it is hoped that eventually a constitutional amendment will be made to each state's individual constitution making this safeguard against fraud mandatory nationwide. For states with democratic majorities in their legislatures this will likely be done by citizen's petitioning for this important piece of legislation. In order for the bill to pass all parties will need to be educated about the real possibilities of voter fraud that are inherent when ID is not required. Everyone should know that this could cause candidates who are not favored by the people to literally steal offices.

Another priority is voting down all bills that call for a National Popular Vote. A National Popular Vote would eliminate the electoral college and virtually hand decision of the entire presidential election to eight or nine heavily populated states. This disproportionate power structure is not what the founders intended and means that the vast majority of the states would be ignored by campaigning presidential candidates. Unfortunately this legislation is being proposed in all 50 states.

We are also working to defeat the call for a Constitutional Convention, which would essentially reopen the Constitution so that it could be rewritten. Parts of the Constitution would be changed in a Constitutional Convention and parts would be eliminated. Can you imagine what would happen if the majority decided that the 20<sup>th</sup> Amendment, limiting our President to two terms, was found to be obsolete and eliminated? We could end up with a dictator, unwilling to relinquish power.

These three important points will shape the future of our country, for either good or bad. Let's give our Republican legislators the support that they need to win against those who would remake our laws and our country into something that the founders clearly never intended.

**AMERICAN HISTORY PARADE  
FLAG DAY**

***Be sure you fly your flag today.*** June 14 is Flag Day, the day we celebrate the birthday of the Stars and Stripes. On June 14, 1777, during the Revolutionary War, the Continental Congress in Philadelphia adopted the Stars and Stripes as the official national flag.

*Resolved, that the Flag of the thirteen United States be thirteen stripes, alternate red and white, that the Union be thirteen stars white on a blue field, representing a new constellation.*

Congress gave no further instructions as to exactly what the flag should look like, such as its dimensions or how the stars should be arranged. Consequently, early U.S. flags did not all look alike. Some flags had stars with six points, others with eight. Some flag makers sewed the stars in rows on the blue field, others in a circle or scattered without an organized pattern.

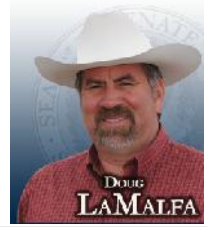
The first official, widespread observance of the flag's birthday came on June 14, 1877, when the flag was one hundred years old. Over the next several years, many schools, veterans groups, and patriotic societies turned the day into a yearly celebration. Mayors and governors began to issue proclamations calling for parades and patriotic events on June 14.

In 1916 President Woodrow Wilson established Flag Day as an annual national celebration. In 1949 Congress and President Truman officially made June 14 a permanent yearly observance.

**LaMalfa Comments on Proposed State Park Closures**  
May 17, 2011

Senator Doug LaMalfa (R-Richvale) issued the following comments on the proposal to close 70 State Parks in California including many in Senate District Four. The proposal comes shortly after Assembly Democrats killed legislation authored by Assemblyman Kevin Jeffries to keep State Parks open even if this year's budget funding was cut. "In any other universe, Assembly Member Jeffries' AB 64 would make perfectly good sense. This legislation meets all of the criteria we should look for when hard budgeting choices need to be made. It represents a creative, practical and cost-effective way to keep many of our parks open. Unfortunately, by killing this bill, it is obvious that the intent is to punish those legislators who refuse to go along with the We-Must-Raise-Taxes mantra rather than looking out for the taxpayers in this state. This is further evidence that those in power don't want park closures to be addressed. In essence, they are saying that increasing taxes supersedes solutions to park closures and many other issues. It's sad, really." AB 64, by Assemblyman Kevin Jeffries (R-Lake Elsinore) would simply "encourage the Department of Parks and Recreation to actively seek to negotiate operating agreements with local governments, ...who have the interest and capacity to assist the state in operating a state park, to minimize the number of state parks that could otherwise be subject to closure."

**LaMalfa Bill to Cut Red Tape for Fairs Passes Committee**  
May 3, 2011

Senator Doug LaMalfa (R-Richvale) today noted that Senate Bill 899, which eliminates state red tape for supply purchases and contracting by fairs, was passed out of the Senate Agriculture Committee with unanimous support. Earlier this year, the state Senate moved to cut the existing \$32 million in state support for the fair system to help resolve the multi-billion dollar deficit. "Many fairs are currently required to receive the state's permission in order to do basic things such as purchasing paper towels, increasing costs for both the fairs and the state," said LaMalfa, who serves as Chair of the Joint Committee on Fairs. "While I remain convinced that supporting fairs is a good investment for California, if the state is no longer funding fairs then the state should have less say over how they operate." Senate Bill 899 would eliminate requirements that the State Department of General Services oversee purchases, hiring and contracting by the fair system and individual fairs. The bill will allow fairs to purchase supplies at lower cost and also give them the ability to contract space to other organizations in order to allow fairs to become self-supporting. "I'm committed to ensuring that California's fairs continue to serve as cultural hubs for communities and economic engines for the state," added LaMalfa. "This bill goes a long way toward that goal, but more work remains to be done."

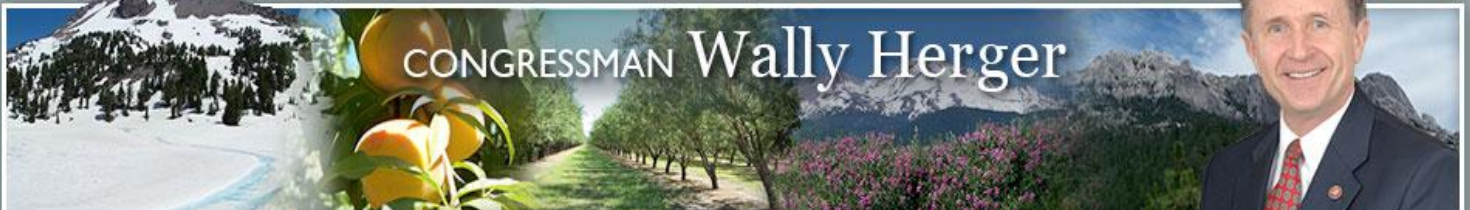

**REPORT FROM WASHINGTON**

**Combating the Wildfire Threat with  
 Commonsense Solutions**

Given your interest in federal land management, I want to tell you about an event I held regarding the [Catastrophic Wildfire Community Protection Act](#), legislation I have introduced to combat the wildfire threat to communities in our area and across America.

Living in Northern California, you know all too well the danger wildfires pose to our lives and property. For too long, frivolous lawsuits from fringe environmental activists have prevented the necessary thinning of our forests. It is essential that we liberate local fire prevention efforts by providing the people living in at-risk communities a greater role in protecting themselves. The *Catastrophic Wildfire Community Protection Act* would do exactly that by allowing critical forest thinning projects to go forward in a timely manner, and authorizing at-risk communities to implement the emergency action plans that they developed to reduce the threat of catastrophic fire. The event was held on the property of Moak family, who instead of evacuating during the 2008 fires, remained behind to defend their property. The surrounding area of Concow was decimated by those fires with over 100 residences lost, serving as a tragic example of the need for significant change in forest management policy. Fortunately, the Moaks were successful in protecting their property. Sadly, however, the 2008 fires took the lives of 12 individuals in Northern California and burned more than a million acres. You can read the full text of my prepared remarks below:

*First off, I would like to thank Pete Moak for hosting us here today. As you can see around you, Pete was in quite a fight a few years ago to protect his home and property. Fortunately he was successful in defending his property but the sad part is that the fire that threatened this community and Pete's home could have been significantly lessened in the first place.*

*The 2008 fire season saw more than a million acres of our forests burned, the tragic loss of several wildland firefighters, the evacuation of thousands and the loss of hundreds of homes and businesses. Sadly, nearly three years later, the forest management situation has yet to improve, leaving the threat of another devastating wildfire season just around the next corner.*

*We cannot control the weather, lightning strikes, or an unfortunate human-induced spark, but we can control the overstocked and*

*unhealthy forests that fuel these fires. Despite the enactment of numerous legislative and administrative actions to address this fuel, our forests and communities remain at-risk to the next lightning storm or stray spark.*

*Which brings us here today. In response to these conditions and the inability of previous efforts to reduce this dangerous fuels build-up. I have introduced the Catastrophic Wildfire Community Protection Act. This legislation builds on and expands existing authorities - such as those authorized by the Healthy Forests Restoration Act of 2003 - to achieve fuels treatments in our at-risk communities to reduce the risk of wildfire through implementation of collaboratively developed fuels reduction and forest thinning projects. This bill also establishes an emergency process to expedite these projects should the county, in concurrence with the state, declare an emergency due to the threat of wildfire.*

*Most North State residents fully understand the reality facing the forests in their backyard. Unfortunately, balanced forest management continues to be opposed by people residing in cities far away from both the forests they supposedly aim to "protect" and the danger facing these communities. Under current law, these fringe groups are allowed to -for the cost of a postage stamp - file lawsuits against any forest management project on federal land that they happen to spot in the Federal Register. These actions occur notwithstanding the input and collaboration from professional foresters and other similarly-trained experts, thus allowing these minority views to displace the science-based efforts of the many individuals who hold a vested interest in sound forest management and reducing the dangerous fuel load around their communities.*

*It is my hope that this legislation can cut through this stalemate and help reduce the immediate risk affecting our forest communities. I will work with my colleagues in the House to move this legislation as quickly as possible. President Obama has spoke about 'restoring science to its rightful place.' I hope that President Obama and the Senate will join me in allowing common-sense forest management and science to prevail in response to the risk of catastrophic wildfire.*
