The following is from an article I have kept about a group of our military leaders visiting wounded soldiers at one of our nation's hospitals a few years ago.

The visiting sergeant major wanted to honor this soldier and show him respect without offending him. But what could he say or do to encourage this wounded man in such a situation? How do you shake the right hand of a soldier who has none? The sergeant major decided to act as though the hand was not missing and gripped the soldier's wrist while speaking words of comfort and encouragement to him.

But there was another man in that group of visitors. He had brought his wife with him to visit the wounded. He knew exactly what to do. The man reverently took the stump of a hand in both of his hands, knelt at the soldier's bedside, and prayed for him.

When this man finished praying, he stood up, bent over the soldier, kissed him on the forehead, and told him that he loved him. What a powerful expression of love for one of our wounded heroes and what a beautiful, Christ-like example.

What kind of man would kneel in such grateful humility and kindness? It was the wounded man's commander in chief—George W. Bush, the President of the United States of America at that time.

This President spoke volumes for all of us who benefit from these kind of personal sacrifices and we continue to pray and bless our troops everywhere. Thank you Lord for brave and courageous men and women who have been called to serve in our military. May we not forget.

AMERICAN HISTORY PARADE "ROSIE THE RIVETER"



On November 28, 1942, during World War II, the assembly line at Ford Motor Company's huge Willow Run plant at Ypsilanti, Michigan, turned out its first production bomber, a B-24 Liberator. By the time the plant reached its peak, in summer 1944, it was producing a bomber an hour—thanks in no small part to Rosie the Riveter.

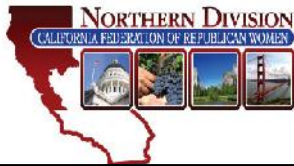
With so many men fighting overseas, war factories across the United States faced a critical labor shortage. Posters bearing slogans such as "Do the Job He Left Behind" and "Soldiers Without Guns" appealed for women workers. Millions of American women who had never worked outside the home traded aprons for overalls and went to work in the factories.

Soon they were tackling jobs only men had done before. They learned welding, drafting, and sheet-metal work to build airplanes, jeeps, and ships. They packed ammo and tested guns, worked in lumber and steel mills, drove trucks, operated cranes and more.

The women often worked six days a week, giving up vacations and holidays as long as the war dragged on. They put up with noisy, gritty working conditions and then, in the evening, many trudged home to take care of their children. All the while, they reminded themselves that their sacrifices would shorten the war and bring loved ones home.

An admiring public nicknamed the women defense workers "Rosie the Riveter." Their tough resourcefulness helped transform America into the arsenal of democracy.

Good afternoon,

The alert today is a bit longer than usual but I want you to have more specific information.

Despite the United Nation's undeniable anti-American bent, the United States is charged higher dues than any other nation – 22 percent of the total. In the last fiscal year, the bill came to \$7.7 Billion – a 21 percent increase over the year before. Now a key leader in the Republican House of Representatives is pressing for reforms commensurate with the extent of the problem and the size of our contributions.

Tomorrow, Oct. 13th at 2 PM, Chairwoman Ileana Ros-Lehtinen (Florida's 18th District), Chair of the House Foreign Affairs Committee plans to hold a mark-up session on H.R. 2829, the United Nations Transparency, Accountability and Reform Act. Passage by that committee would set the stage for action by the full House of Representatives. Chairwoman Ros-Lehtinen proposes to leverage U.S. aid to require real reforms. There are also specific parts of the legislation that deals with the hostility to Israel.

- HR 2829 restores the Bush administration's policy of boycotting the notoriously anti-Israel UN Human Rights Council, putting an end to the Obama administration's ridiculous pretense that joining the panel without requiring reforms would make it less hostile to America and our allies.
- HR 2829 forbids additional American funding to the United Nations Relief and Works Agency until that agency addresses its well-documented deficiencies in preventing the flow of funds to Hamas terrorists and stops disseminating anti-Israel propaganda.

Every single congressional Democrat has refused to co-sponsor HR 2829. Nearly half of the House Republicans have become co-sponsors of HR 2829. Secretary of State Hillary Clinton is determined to derail this legislation.

Please fax, e-mail or call your Congressman and urge him or her to co-sponsor HR 2829.

Have you seen a honor guard flag folding at a military funeral and wondered what was the meaning for this very moving ceremony? Have you noticed the honor guard pays meticulous attention to correctly folding the American flag 13 times? You probably thought it was to symbolize the original 13 colonies, but we learn something new every day! Be surprised at the following because "they" quit teaching this around 1955 in public schools—some of you might remember.



The 1st fold of our flag is a symbol of life.

The 2nd fold is a symbol of our belief in eternal life.

The 3rd fold is made in honor and remembrance of the veterans departing our ranks who gave a portion of their lives for the defense of our country to attain peace throughout the world.

The 4th fold represents our weaker nature, for as American citizens trusting in God, it is to Him we turn in times of peace as well as in time of war for His divine guidance.

The 5th fold is a tribute to our country, for the words of Stephen Decatur, "Our Country, in dealing with other countries, may she always be right; but it is still our country, right or wrong."

The 6th fold is for where our hearts lie. It is with our hearts that, "We pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America, and to the Republic for which it stands, one Nation under God, indivisible, with Liberty and Justice for all."

The 7th fold is a tribute to our Armed Forces, for it is through the Armed Forces that we protect our country and our flag against all her enemies, whether they be found within or without the boundaries of our republic.

The 8th fold is a tribute to the one who entered into the valley of the shadow of death, that we might see the light of day.

The 9th fold is a tribute to womanhood, and Mothers. For it has been through their faith, their love, loyalty and devotion that the character of the men and women who have made this country great has been molded.

The 10th fold is a tribute to the Fathers, for they, too, have given their sons and daughters for the defense of the country since they were first born.

The 11th fold represents the lower portion of the seal of King David and King Solomon and glorifies in the Hebrew's eyes, the God of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob.

The 12th fold represents an emblem of eternity and glorifies, in the Christians' eyes, God the Father, the Son and Holy Spirit.

The 13th fold, or when the flag is completely folded, the stars are uppermost reminding us of our nation's motto, "In God We Trust".

After the flag is completely folded and tucked in, it takes on the appearance of a cocked hat, ever reminding us of the soldiers who served under General George Washington, and the sailors and marines who served under Captain John Paul Jones, who were followed by their comrades and shipmates in the Armed Forces of the United States, preserving for us the rights, privileges and freedoms we enjoy today. There are some traditions and ways of doing things that have deep meaning. In the future, you'll see flags folded and now you will know.

We honor those who gave their lives defending our way of life. God Bless you and God Bless America.

The Final Count

Earlier this week, Governor Brown made his final decision on approximately 700 bills left on his desk. To his credit, he vetoed a great deal, but unfortunately signed and passed a few terrible bills for California. Governor Brown ends this legislative session with these stats: 760 bills signed into law, 128 bills vetoed and 1 bill allowed to pass without the Governor's signature. Below is a short list of bills the CFRW Legislative team tracked; some with official CFRW positions, some without.

AB 131 (Cedillo, D-45) The California Dream Act: **CFRW OPPOSED**, Governor Brown **signed into law**

AB 144 (Portantino, D-44) Firearms restrictions: Governor Brown **signed into law**

AB 499 (Atkins, D-76) HPV/STD treatment for minors 12 years and older: **CFRW OPPOSED**, Governor **signed into law**

AB 101 (Perez, D-46) "Babysitter" Bill to allow childcare providers to unionize: Governor **VETO**

SB 185 (Hernandez, D-24) Affirmative Action for UC/CSU admissions: Governor **VETO**

SB 397 (Yee, D-8) Online Voter Registration: Governor **signed into law**

Stop SB 48 Fails

The initiative effort to repeal SB 48 (Leno, D-3) has failed to collect enough signatures by the Secretary of State's deadline. We supported the effort to repeal this horrible law and many of our members collected signatures for the referendum. Thank you so much for all your hard work. By the numbers, the initiative needed approximately 504,000 signatures and a little more than 497,000 were collected. This is a great accomplishment! But the battle to repeal SB 48 is not over. There are other ways that citizens can abolish bad laws, and those options are being weighed by the Capitol Resources Institute. We will support the efforts, so stay tuned!

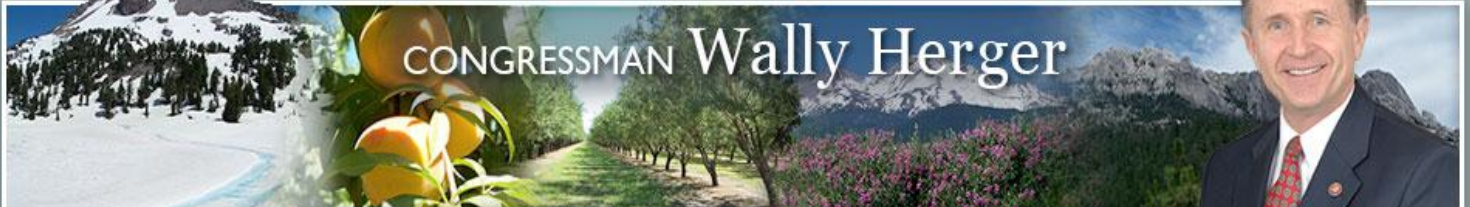

REPORT FROM WASHINGTON

House Votes to Repeal Regulations Harmful to Job Creation
October 14, 2011

In the latest effort to lift the red tape burden off of small businesses, the House has passed legislation, H.R. 2250, to overturn the Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) Boiler MACT regulations. These regulations would require any entity or business that uses a "boiler," – from restaurants to energy plants to schools and churches – to do a costly and unnecessary retrofit to meet new environmental standards. The EPA pushed forward with the regulations despite warnings from the Small Business Administration that they would harm small businesses and a Department of Commerce analysis estimating that the regulations could eliminate as many as 60,000 jobs nationwide. Northern California's biomass industry would be particularly hard hit. At a time of economic hardship, these regulations would only worsen the already unfavorable environment for job creation in our nation with only marginal environmental benefits.

Eliminating costly federal regulations that undermine job creation is a vital step toward creating a positive foundation for economic growth and hiring. In addition to stopping the boiler regulations, the House has passed legislation to put the brakes on pending regulations that would restrict electricity, cement, and coal production and cost jobs in those industries. These measures now await consideration in the Senate. I strongly supported each bill and will continue to everything I can to reduce the costly regulatory burdens that our hurting our small businesses.

Below you can read my remarks on the House floor in favor of H.R. 2250.

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in support of H.R. 2250, which will protect American jobs from the EPA's unnecessary and economically destructive Boiler MACT regulations. At this time of high unemployment and economic hardship, the EPA wants to require costly retrofitting of boilers at small businesses, energy plants, schools and churches in the Northern California congressional district I represent and across the nation. This regulation is another example of the Obama Administration standing in the way of job growth. The Department of Commerce estimates that the 276 pages of federal regulations could eliminate as many as 60,000 jobs nationwide. The EPA's own factsheet says that implementing these rules will cost more than \$5 billion. In August of 2010, the Small Business Administration explicitly warned the EPA that these regulations were too extreme and would harm small businesses. Unfortunately, the EPA did not heed this warning.

"In addition, the boiler regulation will impose substantial and unnecessary costs for Americans to use biomass energy, an essential part of job growth in Northern California. Biomass is a clean and renewable energy source that could help increase our energy supplies and manage our overgrown and fire-prone forests, while creating much-needed jobs. I urge my colleagues to support this legislation to protect jobs and ensure that this costly regulation does not go into effect."

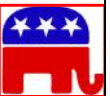
